Fall into Reading

Fall is always a busy time for libraries. All of our libraries are hosting programs for students with either free days (RE-2 and D-16) or early release (RE-1) days in their schedule. Parachute offers programs for middle school students on Mondays, RE-2 students are served through Fridays at Your Library at Rifle, Silt and New Castle, while Glenwood Springs and Carbondale students are served on Wednesday afternoons either in their schools (Glenwood) or at the library (Carbondale). Most of our programs for students focus on STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and math) skills and are free. Check our website for more information and program times at your local branch.

You may have noticed that our online catalog has a new



look. We are excited to offer you a new user experience where all of the formats a book comes in (print, audio, eBook, large print) aggregates into a single view. This is a cutting edge library interface, and we believe you will love the ease of finding what you want with it (see more information on page 8).

I'd like to encourage you to sign up for our email newsletters through your local branch. You'll learn about upcoming programs, hot titles and special events at your library and others in Garfield County.

Finally, this past August, we held six community meetings to hear directly from our communities about how we are doing. We also offered online and paper surveys for feedback. Over 200 people attended the community meetings and over 1,200 responded to the survey. We received a great amount of information that we are digesting and will post the results on our web site in early November. The next steps are to take what we've learned and turn it into an action plan for the next five years. I'll be reporting on these results in our January edition of *Page by Page*.

Book Recommendations


Behind the Beautiful Forevers

I have been a big fan of Indian literature for many years, and was intrigued to read this 2012 National Book Award winner. It takes a classic coming-of-age story of a hardworking young man trying to improve his lot in life, and turns it on its head by weaving in the political, ethnic, religious, and economic realities among India's poorest people. This true story is based on actual interviews Boo collected from people living in Annawadi, a massive slum next to Mumbai's airport.

The story follows Abdul, who works as a garbage recycler, Asha, a woman who dreams of political power, and various other Annawadi residents who each share their hopes and dreams for a better life. This startlingly bleak and honest view of the lives of India's poorest citizens is one few of us see or hear about in the main stream news. I highly recommend this book to anyone wanting to have a

clearer view of today's India.

Jeannine Stickle Youth Services Coordinator Carbondale Branch Library



Partnership Puts Solar Atop Another Library

In 2012, the Garfield County Libraries first partnered with Colorado Mountain College (CMC) to put a 10 kilowatt (kW) solar photovoltaic system on the New Castle Branch Library. In 2013, CMC returned to put a 19.6 kW array on the Silt Branch Library. This summer CMC returned yet again to install the biggest solar array to date on the Carbondale Branch Library.

What makes this partnership so unique is the fact that it's the CMC students and their instructor, Chris Ellis, who are doing the work. Ellis and his eight students in "Photovoltaic Components" last fall worked together to plan out the solar array. Then this summer Master Electrician Jordan Arnhold and others from Green-Tech Electrical worked with Ellis and five of the students from the "Photovoltaic Grid Tied" course to install the solar panels on the Carbondale Branch

Library roof. It took about 350 man hours to complete the installation.

"The continuation of our work with the Garfield County Libraries has been very fulfilling for me personally" said Ellis. "Community projects are a keystone to providing a healthy and sustainable society of which we can all be proud to participate."

The Garfield County Libraries would like to thank CMC and its students for their hard work and partnership on this project. We would also like to thank the Community Office for Resource Efficiency (CORE), private donors, and the Garfield County Public Library Foundation for their generous grants and funding for this important project.

Put in Storyline when you are having a bad day and need some sweet, uplifting


encouragement. Let it fill the air around you and comfort your heart. I recommend you take a break and place a hold on Hunter Hayes' sophomore album today.

Mango Languages

Mango Languages is an online language learning service that provides lessons in speaking, reading, and writing for more than 60 world languages. Mango also includes support for English language learners in more than 15 languages. Language learning in Mango is taught primarily through conversations, but also includes memory activities, grammar

insights, and interactive audio. Special voice comparison exercises and pronunciation helpers ensure that you can master speaking with ease. There are also fun mini courses such as German for Oktoberfest, French for Romance, and even Pirate.

Perhaps the best way to use Mango is on the go. There are apps for Apple and Android smartphones so you can learn wherever you are, whenever you have a few minutes.

The Garfield County Libraries also offer Mango Premier which features movies with extensive language support and semantic color coded subtitles. Cultural tips are strategically placed in each film to help you understand the subtext behind the action.

Whether you're going on vacation or are ready to check "learn a foreign language" off your bucket list, the Libraries are ready to help with language learning from Mango.



Literacy Outreach

Literacy is Not Optional

Literacy is not about reading the latest Lee Child book, but an essential and basic necessity. In the U.S. today, there are 36 million adults who can't read better than the average third grader.

Students in our tutoring program include sisters who blindly signed admissions paper at the local hospital when told one of them had a tumor, a longtime worker in danger of losing his job because he could not pass an online test, a mother who could not help her third grader with his math homework, a gifted craftsman who cannot speak English and waits for his "It's not just 'their' problem,


cannot speak English and waits for his wife to come home to return client phone calls, and a twenty-something

who was promoted to supervisor, but can't read the instructions from her boss or take a simple phone message.

it's everyone's problem."

Dozens of adults have entered our program because they could not read their mail or a posted sign. This results in late fees accrued, court dates missed, benefits lost, and opportunities forfeited. Some of them pay for these mistakes for years.

Without literacy, options for making even a basic living are limited, leading to poverty, stress,



If you believe it doesn't involve you, you're wrong - illiteracy affects all of us through major economic loss, an overburdened school system, greater crime, and increased costs for

healthcare and state assistance programs. It is not just "their" problem, it's everyone's problem.

Libraries Launch First-of-its-Kind Online Catalog

The Garfield County Libraries have recently launched a new online catalog that is much easier to use. It offers additional features to enhance how you access books, movies, eBooks, and services online. With a cleaner design that is more closely integrated with the library's website, the new online catalog will now work on any size device: from smartphones to tablets, laptops to desktop computers.

When you search the new catalog for an item, you will now be instantly directed to all of the library's copies of a title, no matter what format that material is (hardback, audio CD, eBook, etc.) or which library has a copy on their shelf. When you request an item, an advanced algorithm determines which copy can get into your hands the fastest, and places a hold on that copy for you. The technology running these features is the first of its kind in the country, and we are proud to be among the small group of libraries in Colorado to have it.

There are additional features that come with this new catalog including online library card registration, incorporation of all library materials including eBooks and Zinio online magazines, personalized recommendations, and SMS text notifications.
