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Libraries Receive Grant to Help Job Seekers

Garfield County Libraries was recently awarded an \$18,500 grant to fund an adult computer education program called GoToWorkshops@YourLibrary. We are partnering with Literacy Outreach and Colorado Mountain College (CMC) to develop and conduct workshops that teach adults basic computer skills necessary in securing employment. This grant is funded through the federal

Library Service and Technology Act (LSTA). Garfield County Libraries was one of 10 libraries statewide to receive LSTA funding this year!

Classes will be offered on a variety of topics - from beginning computer skills to personal accounting basics to job searching techniques. Workshops will be held in all six libraries with offerings in both English and Spanish and will start in December. CMC will support the program by making referrals to these classes and by recommending bilingual, qualified, trained instructors who have developed and facilitated computer classes and job skills workshops. Literacy Outreach will also refer bilingual

trainers and students to these workshops. All entities will work together to promote this program and other similar programs offered by CMC and Literacy Outreach.

Currently, CMC offers free Go2Workshops twice a week during the day at CMC campuses in Rifle and Glenwood Springs.



These workshops are designed as unstructured, drop-in periods during which anyone can receive help from skilled instructors on any topic related to computer skills and job seeking. GoToWorkshops@YourLibrary is designed as an expansion to this program as it will provide structured courses during

evenings and weekends at all of our locations from Parachute to Carbondale.

If you or anyone you know is interested in attending any of these free workshops, make sure you check the Garfield County Libraries online calendar (www.gcpld.org/calendar) in November, as classes will be starting in December!



Community Reads Take on Issues of Diversity



There are two community reads events going on in October, and both just happen to center around a book taking on issues of diversity in our country.



One Book, One Town presented by the Friends of the Gordon Cooper Library is featuring *Just Like Us* by Helen Thorpe. *Just Like Us* is the true story of four girls of Mexican descent who grow up in America. Two of the girls have papers, and two do not.

As these high school girls look to their future they find their dreams hinge on their legal status. Thorpe (who is married to then Mayor John Hickenlooper) follows the girls and their friendship as well as talks about the political backdrop in Denver where they live.

Helen Thorpe will speak at the Third Street Center's Round Room in Carbondale on Thursday, October 13th at 7 p.m. The program will coincide with the Carbondale Council of Arts and Humanities SWAN (Support Women Artists Now) events in October.

Update from the Director

Building(s) with Books

Despite the ongoing financial impact from the State of Colorado's sales tax refund, we are continuing to build new libraries throughout Garfield County. We are making brisk progress at the branch library in New Castle and we celebrated the last beam being hoisted last week. We are focusing on promoting donor opportunities at this time. If you are interested in learning more about potential donations, contact Kelsy Been at 625-4270 or by email at kbeen@gcpld.org. The New Castle Branch Library will reopen in its home location next March, and you can visit the temporary branch next door to Subway and City Market at [820 Castle Valley Blvd.](http://820.CastleValleyBlvd) The building is being designed by Michael Hassig and Brad Zeigel of A4 Architects and is being built by B&H Construction.

The building features an expandable meeting room to accommodate larger events as well as two study rooms, unique children's and teen spaces, and a plaza between the existing Silt Town Hall and the new library. The plaza will feature 28 concrete "books". Donors will have an opportunity to name their favorite title and author as part of the installation.

We have also made great progress with the planning for a new branch library in Glenwood Springs at the corner of Cooper Avenue and Eighth Street, with the Glenwood Springs Downtown Development

Authority, the City of Glenwood Springs, and Colorado Mountain College (CMC). The team hired Dennis Humphries of Humphries Polis Architecture to design the new library and contract negotiations are underway with a general contractor for the project as well. The site will include a new 14,000 square foot library on the ground floor, a community plaza, and a second floor that will provide future expansion space for CMC. The project is slated to break ground in April 2012.

In Carbondale, the District is currently reviewing proposals for architects to design the new library for the community. We plan to hire an architect in October and get started with the design process later this fall. The project is slated for a 13,000 square foot facility at the corner of Sopris and Third Avenue. Public meetings will be

planned once we have an architect in place. We hope to break ground by next summer, with a completion date of mid-2013.

The Mount Sopris Historical Society is exploring the possibility of creating a time capsule as part of the project. Watch their web site for more information at www.mtsoprishistoricalsociety.org.

We are committed to providing safe and efficient facilities and are working to ensure that overall operational costs for the District remain low as we expand our facilities to meet the library needs of the future. Check out how our buildings are doing at garfieldenergynavigator.org.

We intend to complete all remaining library projects by the end of 2013 to take advantage of current cost savings associated with the slower economy. Information about our projects can be found on our construction page at www.gcpld.org/construction. Check there regularly for new blog posts as well as addenda and updates.

The Silt Branch Library has begun design development and will break ground in March 2012 to open later

that year. The architect is Paul Tremontozzi of Oz Architecture and the contractor is FCI.

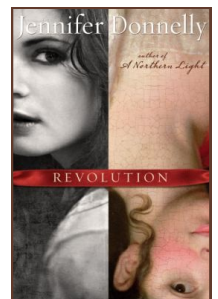
Revolution

This is a well crafted and thoughtful book although the storyline is not new: a girl finds a lost journal and learns both about history and about herself. Some of the journal entries from the French Revolution are a bit too contemporary in style and content. Music, history, a bit of romance and the heartache of loss are all elements of this story. Donnelly presents her moral like an unexpected and wonderful piece of chocolate: a thing to be savored, treasured and which will linger long after you close the book.

The Common Reader program presented by Colorado Mountain College is featuring *A Mighty Long Way* by Carlotta Walls LaNier. In 1957 Carlotta was only 14, but was already changing history as a member of “The Little Rock Nine.” She, along with eight other African American students, attended classes at Little Rock Central High School for the first time. They had to be escorted by military guards and endure countless insults and threats, but these students succeeded in integrating the school and breaking down barriers.

Carlotta’s account depicts how transformative an education can be for a person, and it was because her family valued education that she volunteered to change schools. Yet the book goes beyond just her entering the building, it is much, much more than that.

Carlotta will speak at the West Garfield Campus in Rifle on Tuesday, October 18th at 7 p.m., the Aspen Campus on Wednesday, October 19th at 10 a.m., and the Spring Valley Campus on Wednesday, October 19th at 7 p.m. Both students and community members are welcome at these events.

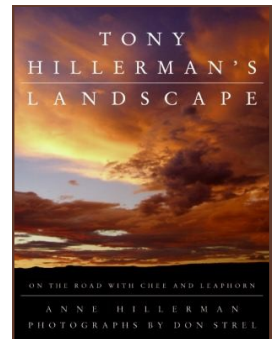

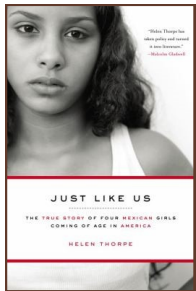

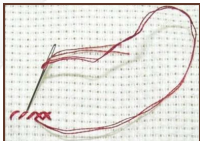

Like dogs? Well, our four legged friends are guests of honor at Paws to Read events at the libraries.

The Gordon Cooper, New Castle, and Rifle Branch Libraries are all going to be hosting regular Paws sessions so you can enjoy time with the dogs.

Why read to dogs? Well, first of all... it's totally fun.

Learning Express: your ticket to knowledge

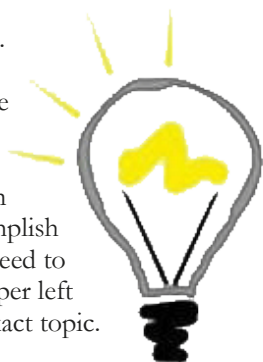

Create an account to take full advantage of the amazing resources that Learning Express offers you. Learning Express is organized into Learning Centers, which are listed along the left side of the window. Within each of these Learning Centers is a list of practice tests, essays, tutorials, and eBooks. You can choose from any of these formats to accomplish your goals. If you know exactly what you need to learn, you can use the search box in the upper left corner of the window to search for your exact topic.

Learning Express offers the following resources:

Homework Help: Learning express offers assistance to students from elementary school through college.

You can get help on Math, Vocabulary, Science, Writing, Social Studies and more. You can practice math skills by

Literacy Outreach Turns 25!

Dorothy started it twenty-five years ago. Barbara continued it, then Linda took over in 1990. Starr picked up the banner in 1995, and Martha has been in charge for the last fourteen years.

"It" is Literacy Outreach.

These five women have, each in turn, dedicated years to the difficult work of its mission: teaching non-literate adults of Garfield County how to read.

For twenty-five years these directors of Literacy Outreach have sought, trained, and organized volunteers so that each student could have a personal teacher. They have located students who are sometimes part of our "hidden culture" of non-readers in Garfield County.

The five directors have written grants, conducted fund-raisers, filed reports, done research, attended conferences, coordinated schedules, and made sure that volunteers and students alike were honored for their efforts. They have swept floors. They have baked cookies. You get the picture.

So now we want to say, "THANKS!" On the 25th anniversary of Literacy Outreach, we want to express thanks particularly to the five women who have led Literacy Outreach for the past quarter century. They are:

Dorothy Snearley, the founder of the Garfield County Literacy Project in 1986. Dorothy still lives in Glenwood Springs and continues to help improve people's lives.

Barbara Garypie, who, along with her husband Ren (former Garfield County Public Library Director), worked with Dorothy in the early years of the organization.

Linda Halloran, who started in 1990. She helped redefine the mission to include the burgeoning non-English speaking population of the area.

Starr Svaldi, who now is an educator at Jefferson County School District in Denver.

Martha Fredendall, our current Executive Director. She has been with us the longest by far, and has expanded every facet of our program. Under Martha's guidance, Spellebration (begun by Linda in the early 90s) and the Canyon Shuffle have become highly anticipated fundraising events. Literacy Outreach earned accreditation by ProLiteracy America with Martha at the helm, as well as gaining status as its own 501(c)(3). Martha has continued the legacy of her predecessors, and has made Literacy Outreach an integral part of the communities we serve.

Thanks, ladies! Because of you Literacy Outreach has been helping people for 25 years.

Find a Job with Help from a New Partnership

Looking for a job?

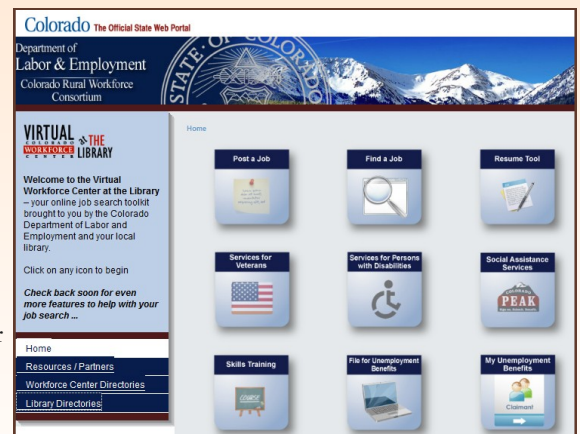
Start your search at the library.

The Garfield County Libraries are participating in a statewide project to connect Workforce Centers and libraries. The libraries are now giving access to “Virtual Workforce Centers” in all six locations. This new partnership allows job seekers greater access to services through their local library.

Virtual Workforce Centers can be accessed from any library internet computer via a link on the desktop. You can also access it from the Libraries’ website www.gcpld.org. The link will take you to a page that can help you find a job, create a resume, file

and manage unemployment benefits, and find out about services for veterans, persons with disabilities, and social assistance services. Ellen Golombek, Executive Director of the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment, said “we think these virtual workforce centers will help job seekers who are increasingly turning to libraries for career exploration and job search activities.”

If you are in need of “hands on” assistance, we’ve also got you covered.
