Get Ready to Read Every Day

As spring break is now over, a lot of people will have summer on their minds. This year the Garfield County Libraries would like to be a part of your entire family's summer plans with "Read Every Day," a summer reading program for children, teens, and adults. We are hoping to transform the way everyone thinks of the summer reading program by making it simple, enjoyable, and something you can do alone or as a family.

With "Read Every Day" the libraries will be encouraging you to read at least 20 minutes each day in June and July. Children (11 and under) will get reading logs and fun stickers to track the days they read, while teens (12 to 18) and adults will get bookmarks for the same purpose. Once children read for seven days they can bring in their reading log and pick a prize off our prize board. Prizes include books

and coupons generously provided by local businesses. Once teens and adults read for seven days they can bring in their completed bookmarks for entry into prize drawings. In addition to drawings throughout the summer for teens and adults, we will also have an end of the summer drawing at each library where we will be giving away a Nook (the Barnes and Noble eReader) to one lucky adult and one lucky teen at each branch.

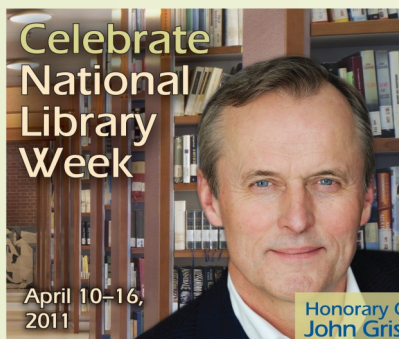
The more you read, the greater your chances of winning.

Update from the Director

Keep Your Hard Hats On!

Residents in New Castle began using the temporary library facility located in the shopping center by City Market at 820 Castle Valley Blvd in February as construction got under way downtown. The renovation of the old library building has begun, and we will be adding 6,000 square feet to its main floor. Some of the improvements include a large community meeting room, access to the library's local history collection, dedicated children's and teen spaces and study rooms. The entire main floor of the library will be renovated with a total project cost of around \$2.3 million.

The architect on the project is A4 Architects of Carbondale and the project is being managed by B&H General Contractors of Glenwood Springs. Construction on the new facility should take about ten months, and the library will reopen in early 2012.



The Library District took a huge step forward in Silt in March with the acquisition of the property at the corner of Seventh Street and Home Avenue. Next door to the Silt Town Hall and across the parking lot from the existing library, the new site will allow for the construction of a new 7,500 square foot building. The existing library will remain and will be taken over by the Town for other purposes.

The new library will feature a community room and expanded space for books, computers and seating. The Library District is working with the Town to develop a joint parking lot and civic plaza area as part of the project. Construction could start as early as this fall.

The Carbondale Branch Library (Gordon Cooper) is looking to relocate to the corner of Sopris Avenue and Third Street, adjacent to the Bridges High School in Carbondale. This library will be approximately 13,000 square feet and will share parking with the existing school and businesses located nearby. The Library District is completing work on an agreement with the Roaring Fork School District #1 on a parking agreement, as well as with the Town of Carbondale, before going forward with the project. We anticipate starting the planning process for this

library before the end of 2011.

Finally, the Library District has been involved in a joint effort with the City of Glenwood Springs, the Glenwood Springs Downtown Development Authority and Colorado Mountain College to select a location in downtown Glenwood for a new library. A site at the corner of Eighth Street and Cooper Avenue has been identified as a possible location for a new library, parking lot and plaza area. The Library District continues to be in negotiations with the other partners on this property and hopes to move forward with a new library location in the coming year.

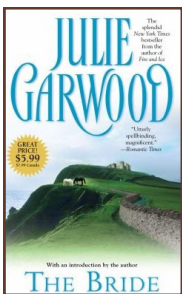

The Bride by Julie Garwood

This is an historical romance set in England and Scotland in 1100. Alec Kincaid has been instructed by his king to marry an English bride, one of the daughters of Barron Jamison. Jamie has been ordered to marry a Scot by her King. Both rulers believe that this marriage alliance will help avert war between the two nations. Alec and Jamie find themselves married and traveling to Kincaid land in the Highlands where they will face a group of Highlanders

contemptuous of the English, a killer who will not abide Alec's happiness even in an arranged marriage, and the marriage that will either make or break them. This was the first romance I read where I laughed out loud. Alec and Jamie's banter, attraction and eventual fall into love are funny, touching and realistic. The steam level is low, but the readability is blazing! This is the first book by Julie Garwood that I read and I enjoyed it so much that it has become a comfort read that I've read again and again. 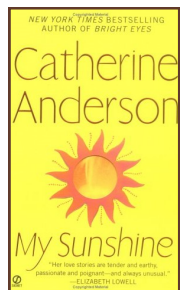
My Sunshine

tax for twenty years to construct and operate new libraries. All six libraries were in need of expansion at that time and we knew that inflation would eat away at our ability to build if we waited too long to start. The Library District made the decision in 2009 to sell Certificates of Participation and have financed four of the six library projects this way. Despite the downturn in sales and property tax, we intend to continue to aggressively pursue

the remaining library projects in Garfield County to take advantage of current cost savings associated with the slower economy.

Books for Babies

The Garfield County Public Library Foundation has launched "Books for Babies," a program aimed at families of newborn children. Books for Babies provides a book bag with a library card application and a high-quality, age-appropriate board book, as well as information on the importance of reading to young children and library services available to new parents. The bags are being distributed through pediatricians' offices and family medical clinics throughout Garfield County at a child's first well-visit. Books for Babies allows the library to connect with new parents from the start, with information about the importance of reading and language in a young child's development. The board books and other materials are bilingual (English and Spanish) and the books are designed to be engaging and interactive for parents and children. The Library Foundation hopes Books for Babies will make a strong and early connection with parents of young children and the public library. Books for Babies is funded through the Library Foundation and the City Market Cares program. For more information on this program, contact 625-4270.

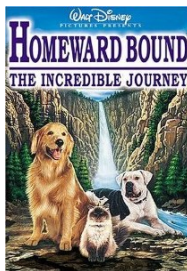

You don't need to worry about what materials to bring - we've got you covered, and there is no charge for the starter kit you can take home with you. There are only 8 spots available so please contact the library to

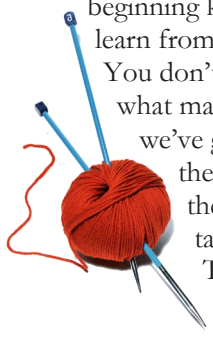

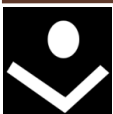
Teen Web Page Now Live!
