Financial Setback Hits Garfield County, Libraries

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Recently, the Library District learned from Roxy Huber, Executive Director of the Colorado State Department of Revenue, that all entities receiving county sales tax will be impacted by a sizable loss of revenue. The Department of Revenue lost a lawsuit regarding a vendor overcharging sales tax from 2002 to 2005, and a refund is now due those companies who were impacted by the error.

Although the taxes were collected over several years, the refund is immediate, and will be subtracted from our current sales tax collections starting in July 2011 and continuing through June 2012. The amount of sales tax refund owed by Garfield County is around \$3.9 million, with the Library District's share one-fourth of that amount. We receive one quarter cent of the County's one cent of sales tax that is collected by the state, and those funds are used to operate all six libraries.

This has been devastating news for the Library District as sales tax revenues have steadily declined for the past 3 years with sales tax collections down over 50% from their historic highs in 2007 and 2008. Reducing our operating income by another \$1 million would have certainly resulted in a reduction in library operating hours and staff. We have been helped in our hour

of need by the Garfield County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) through their decision to cover half of the amount for the other sales tax-funded entities in the County, including the Library District. The generosity of the BOCC is greatly appreciated and will definitely help us survive this blow.

Going forward, we know that cutting the remaining amount from our already tight budget is going to be challenging and we are working diligently to determine where additional cuts can be found. The Library District's Board of Trustees is committed to doing everything they can to prevent any cuts in services to the public.

Despite the drop in sales tax revenues, we will continue with the construction of new libraries. Our construction budget is funded through property tax as part of a ballot initiative approved in 2006 to allow us to build or remodel all six libraries in Garfield County. Revenues from property tax can only be used for library operations after construction is complete.

Rifle's and Parachute's new libraries opened in 2010, New Castle's remodel and expansion project is underway and design development has begun for a new library in Silt.

The generosity of the BOCC is greatly appreciated and will definitely help us survive this blow.

Update from the Director

Projects to continue despite sales tax decline

If you've heard the recent news about sales tax revenues, there may be some question in your mind as to whether or not the Library District can continue building new libraries. The answer is an unequivocal yes! Since the District sold Certificates of Participation to finance the projects, we are compelled to finish all construction projects by the end of 2013. The good news is that despite the financial hit that the District is going to take with declining revenues, our capital budget is supported by property tax and should only see minimal impact from the \$500,000 sales tax loss we will take over the next two fiscal years. We are thankful that the Board of County Commissioners has assisted us in helping to offset this unfortunate turn of events.

we are finally under construction there after a long wait this spring. There have been a few surprises but the project is moving briskly forward and we are looking at a re-opening next March. We are working with B&H Construction as the general contractor on the job with Michael Hassig and Brad Zeigel of A4 Architecture doing the design work. We recently hired FCI as the contractor for the new library in Silt with Paul Trementozzi of Oz Architecture as the design team. **We will be hosting a community meeting on July 20th at 6:30 p.m. at the Silt Branch Library to discuss the design plans and gather community input about the new library.**

We have purchased a 24,000 square foot lot at the corner of Sopris Avenue and Third Street, adjacent to the Bridges High School, for a new library in Carbondale. We recently negotiated an agreement with the Town of Carbondale to spend up to

\$500,000 for public improvements on the site (such as streets, utilities, and paving) in exchange for our existing library building on Fourth Street. We anticipate starting the planning process for this library this fall. Finally, the Library District is a part of a joint effort between the City of Glenwood Springs, the Glenwood Springs Downtown Development Authority and Colorado Mountain College to construct a new library in downtown Glenwood Springs at the corner of Eighth Street and Cooper Avenue along with parking and a plaza. We have been working to determine actual costs of construction on this site and should have a firm decision about what the project will look like come September. We will invite the public for input on these projects once we have a design team on board.

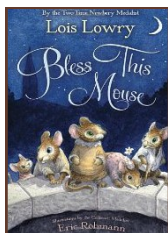

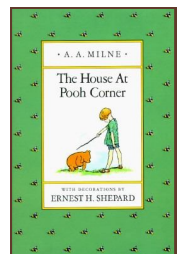

The Library District is purchasing land from the Roaring Fork School District RE-1 for a new library in Carbondale and is working with the City of Glenwood Springs, the Downtown Development Authority and Colorado Mountain College to build a new facility in Glenwood Springs. All facilities should be completed by the end of 2013.

The Library District continues to be committed to building energy efficient buildings with an open design that will allow us to keep staffing to a minimum and operational costs as low as possible. The Library District has strong reserves and every budget discussion reflects our desire to create a sustainable and vibrant organization for the future. 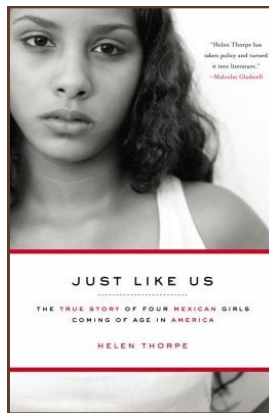

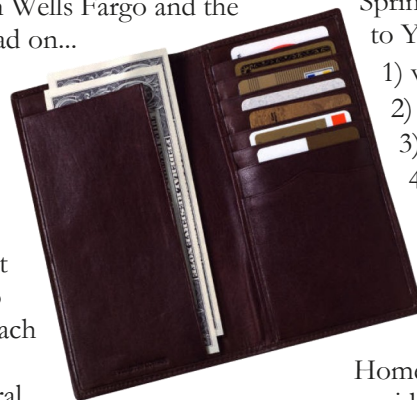
Literacy Outreach

My name is Terrie. As one of the attendees at the first workshop, I want to encourage you to sign up and go to the next one. (Contact Literacy Outreach at 945-5282.) I learned so much that I found myself taking notes about several excellent ways to pare my monthly bills. I now feel that I’m taking some solid steps toward wiser handling of our family’s finances, steps I hadn’t even thought about before. The workshop was small, encouraging, and casual. No one asked me personal questions; they just gave me idea after idea.



I felt completely comfortable, and even got suggestions from the other participants.

The next workshops will be held in English on Tuesday, July 26th at 6:30 p.m.. and in Spanish on Thursday, July 28th at 12:30 p.m.. Both will be at the Glenwood Springs Branch Library. The topic will be “Using Credit to Your Advantage” and it will cover areas such as:

- 1) what credit is and how to make it work for you,
- 2) what your credit score and credit report mean,
- 3) how to use credit cards and loans wisely, and
- 4) how to deal with debt problems.
